Rioting in the streets. The burning of a Lutheran church in Nairobi Kenya with some people of the "wrong tribe" left inside. After the fire a page from a Bible was found. Psalm 124 was the only thing left on that page. A young man who grew up in that church tells his story after the fire. Josephat was baptized at the Kibera Church in 1984. He attended catechism classes and was confirmed in that church. He says he was "pulled to the church" by his mother as he grew up. He was blessed with a mom who realized the importance of faith. To him the salvation of that page from the Bible has two important meanings: 1) Many of our congregation lost property—but none of us lost our lives; 2) The church still stands and is still united. We are of all tribes but we have a united congregation. He says, "After the fire the church sought to reach out to those who burnt our church. The buildings of the church may be burnt, but most important is that we have become strengthened in our faith and even grown in recognizing the importance of forgiveness

News:

- Because we needed to leave Nairobi in the middle of May, Sarah missed the last two weeks of school. She seems to have gotten over it though, and is thoroughly enjoying her extended summer!
- We stopped in Chicago and had three coffees hosted by Debbie Sweet and Rita Versendaal, who are serving as MiniMissionaries in Nairobi at this time.
- Doug and Rebecca sang a duet at our home church.
- Prices continue to rise in Kenya. Fuel is now \$1.60
 a liter (over \$6.00 a gallon) and inflation is twenty one percent.
- During the clinic, our three doctors were able to see 1,170 patients. Sixteen patients were newly diagnosed as being HIV positive.

Thanksgiving:

- God's provision of safety to our Village and family during post election rioting and violence in Kenya.
 The election violence seems to be behind us and peace has returned.
- There are currently eighty children at the Village.

- Elijah continues speech therapy and is showing slow progress.
- Thanks for Susan and Bob Hegel. Our dryer has been repaired! Our dryer broke at the beginning of May and replacement belts are not available in Kenya, so we have had to air-dry all laundry.
- Thank you to all who prayed fervently for all of the ROS and MiniMissionaries during the unrest earlier this year. God answered your prayers magnificently.
- Thank you to all who have volunteered to host a coffee this year. Over half of these people are doing this for the first time.
- Giving God thanks for the McReynolds family who graciously took us into their home.
- God has blessed the Village with more rain.
- Doug Koepke, Tim Cagwin, and Tom Kreamer met with our older boys for four weeks to discuss issues associated with puberty.
- The children and mothers were able to get checkups during the community clinic.

Our home church in Abilene has taken in two families of refugees from Burundi. Who would have thought that Kiswahili could come in handy in Abilene, Texas?! It seems that everywhere we go God has raised up mission-minded Christians who are actively walking the talk, and generously loving their neighbors. Of all the things we are thankful for, we are most thankful for you.

We thank God each of you. You have made it possible for our family to serve in Kenya since 2000. We are praying that God will allow us more years to serve Him in Africa.
